

Year 3

Year 3 have been busier than Santa's elves in December! In English, we have thoroughly enjoyed learning about the key features to include when writing a set of instructions as part of non-fiction writing. Our chosen title? **How to Trap Santa!** Can you believe Year 3 would want to do this?

The children had great fun planning and writing their instructions using subheadings and bullet points to provide clear steps. Since the steps needed to be followed in chronological order, learning about time connectives was important. We also added adverbs to the imperative verbs to make their steps clear.

We look forward to sharing more about this learning at our next year 3 assembly which we hope you can attend on Friday 30th January.

Year 4

As we wrap up the final bits of the term, the students have been working with great energy and excitement — all to the soundtrack of Christmas music, of course! Year 4 have especially enjoyed learning some old-school Christmas classics with Mrs Price, and it's been delightful to hear them singing along whenever those familiar tunes play in class.

In English, we celebrated finishing *The Iron Man*. The children have been dissecting the author's use of language and exploring how these techniques can help develop their own writing further. In Maths, we have been learning about nets of 3D shapes and exploring how flat shapes can be folded into solid forms. The children did brilliantly applying this knowledge to create their own Christmas-themed 3D models from nets — a fantastic blend of maths and festive creativity!

Year 5

Last week, Year 5 transformed their classroom into an exciting museum, and what a brilliant afternoon it was! The museum was a wonderful opportunity for the children to showcase their learning from across the term, bringing together history, geography and science in a fun, interactive way.


Each child became both a teacher and a guide, proudly presenting the work they have completed throughout the term. Parents were invited to explore the work, ask questions and take part in the hands-on activities that had been prepared. From model displays and research posters to NVR puzzles, maths competitions and scrambled word activities. The room was bursting with creativity, fun and knowledge!

The Year 5 children thoroughly enjoyed sharing their expertise, and as their teacher it was great to see them confidently explaining their learning and engaging their families in the topics we have explored this term.

Thank you to all the parents who were able to join us last Thursday afternoon. Our Classroom Museum was a huge success, and we are already looking forward to building on this enthusiasm in the Spring term.

Year 6

Max, our Head of Library Prefect has been busy creating the 'Oakhyrst Grange Christmas Reading Challenge.' In English, we have been diving into persuasive writing using *The Day the Crayons Quit* as our inspiration. The children enjoyed matching persuasive features around the classroom to the correct definitions before searching for them in the different crayon letters. Their own letters - written in role as a colour crayon - were full of clever puns and impressive persuasive techniques.

Over in Reading, the children have been exploring a range of passages, looking closely at verbs, adjectives and figurative language to understand how authors create atmosphere. Meanwhile, in Grammar, we've been developing our use of relative clauses and learning how brackets and dashes can be used to add parenthesis.

Moving on to Maths, the class stepped into the world of shape. Using string, they worked together to create polygons and quadrilaterals and used new vocabulary such as *congruent* and *adjacent* to describe them. We also examined angles in triangles and quadrilaterals, applying our knowledge of shape properties to calculate missing angles across a variety of problems.

In Geography, the children were captivated by the story of Mount Vesuvius. They created a clear and thoughtful timeline of the eruption and discussed the impact it had on the people of Pompeii. In Science, the children used iPads to research extinct animals - choosing from the woolly mammoth, elasmosaurus and supersaurus. They also discovered whether each one has any modern day relatives.

Sport

It has been a busy ending to the Autumn term in terms of sport here at Oakhyrst Grange School. We have had our final few fixtures as well as some Christmas fun during PE & Games lessons. Below is a brief summary:

U11 Surrey Cup Football v Boxgrove

The boys faced tough opposition in their recent fixture, coming up against a strongly organised Boxgrove School side. Although the result didn't go our way, the team showed determination throughout and continued to work hard until the final whistle. Hopefully it will prove to be an important learning curve as the boys grow in confidence and continue to develop their game.

ISA National Swimming Finals

Lizzie Kelly was our lone representative at the ISA Swimming Nationals on Friday the 28th November. It was held at the impressive Olympic pool in London which made it even more of a momentous day. Lizzie gave an outstanding performance in her race, winning a gold medal in the 50m backstroke in the para race. What a great achievement on an unforgettable day! 


